FROM THE TREASURER

The end of the year is fast approaching. Before we know it, we treasurers will be pulling our year end data together and filling out the end of year report that must be sent to Headquarters.

The task will be a relatively easy one, if we have been creating quarterly financial statements for our chapters. As Region treasurer, I work on the Carolinas region books almost every week. I maintain a spread sheet of our income and expenses on a monthly basis. As the end of each quarter rolls around, I just pull my numbers for the quarterly financial statements from the spread sheet. This goes a long way to making the reporting process less of a drudgery.

Anyone who knows me or has taken a class with me knows that I am just not a counted kind of person. So I am not terribly fond of numbers. That's why I like to keep my records orderly and as simple as possible and also why I work on them weekly when possible.

If you have not been doing quarterly financial statements for your chapter, I would highly recommend that you do so. These statements are an invaluable tool for keeping track of where the chapter stands financially. They, along with the annual budget, are also very, very important for future planning.

Another end of year task is housecleaning. We do not need to keep every bit of paper forever. Page 20 of the Chapter/Region Financial Guidelines, which can be found on the EGA website, tells us what records to keep and for how long.

Read over those guidelines and then purge, PURGE! If you have inherited a huge volume of paperwork from your predecessor, PURGE! Get rid of the unnecessary! But do so with care!

Once you have determined what you are going to get rid of, please shred those documents and papers of a confidential nature: copies of canceled checks, anything with identifying information, anything that has a bank account number or social security number on it. SHRED!!! If you don't personally own a shredder, get one. You should be shredding your own personal documents.

You don't want to become a victim of identity theft and you don't want to cause anyone else to become such a victim. SHRED!!!

Also, there is no reason why a chapter should be collecting anyone's social security number. Teachers must fill out W-9's and send them to headquarters when they begin teaching for EGA. So chapters and regions don't need that information. If you find documents with that information on them black out those numbers until you can take them to the shredder. You may have to hold onto the document for a few years, but you can still protect your membership by making sure no one gets hold of that sensitive information. SHRED!!!

Are you getting the subliminal message (SHRED!!!!) here? SHRED!!!!!

Confused? Read your guidelines and feel free to get in touch with me. I'll try to help or find someone who can!
