This is the year that our Region and all of our CAR chapters must review their bylaws.

We are very happy to report that our Region has completed its bylaw review process, under the direction of Bylaws Chair Becky Buie and former Region Director Janet Noble. In addition, as of this writing 6 chapters have completed the process as well: Aiken, Cardinal, Chicora, Golden Needle, Millwood, and The Laurel.

Five other chapters have just the final step left: Blue Ridge, Florence, Low Country, Magnolia, and Piedmont. Four chapters have recently begun the process but are going to work hard to try to complete their work by the end of the

year: Augusta, Charlotte, Star Stitchers, and Tryon. Congratulations, all, and thank you for your hard work! We appreciate what you have done.

What does EGA Do For Me?

Some people may question the need to be a member of EGA. After all, you can just stitch at home with a few friends for free. However, there are many benefits to belonging to EGA, and your dues will help to continue to provide them. This article will highlight just a few of reasons why EGA membership is important:

The EGA website (egausa.org) offers a number of free projects as well as a handbook of embroidery basics and instructions on how to colorwash your canvas. There are also patterns that you can buy from the "Designers Across America" series and from the National Outreach project. (Janet Noble, our new EGA President, has designated her focus as America's wounded service members. Watch for an-

nouncements on the new projects that will support this effort.)

The EGA offers a lending library of more than 2000 books on needlework, and you may borrow books for just the cost of shipping and handling. EGA also has a reference section of rare or historic materials that do not circulate. In addition, your chapter can borrow "study boxes" on a wide variety of needlework topics. See the website for details: https://egausa.org/library/

One of the most popular recent benefits is the monthly online "stitchalong" project. A new project is introduced on the first day of every month. The directions are available for free as downloadable files including, if you have missed them, directions for all previous stitch-along projects. Take a look and get involved. To get you started, here is the link for November's project: https://egausa.org/stitch-along-november-wessex/. You do not have to belong to Facebook if you want to get the patterns; you will not be able to post any comments if you are not on Facebook, but in all other aspects you can access the projects.

Finally, EGA provides us with an instant group of friends who understand our passion for needlework and, as one stitcher wrote on her recent evaluation, provides "friends that understand [our] need to have more than one project on the go at a time."

Reconnecting on the Ridge

Make plans to join us for our new event: a spring stitch retreat! This will be a relaxing stitch-in with additional optional activities. We will meet at the Mountain Lodge and Conference Center in Flat Rock, NC (www.mountainlodgeflatrock.com), from Friday, May 31 – Sunday, June 2, 2019. This venue is conveniently located just off exit 53 on I-26.

We are calling it "Reconnecting on the Ridge" because it will give us a chance to reconnect with the Blue Ridge area, where we have met for so many previous spring seminars. We can also reconnect with our EGA friends for some fun and lots of stitching time. Finally, and this is just a suggestion, we can use this weekend to reconnect with some of our previous EGA projects that we have been meaning to get back to.

Our plans are still evolving so we do not have a retreat cost yet, but we are going to keep the cost as low as we can. We will send out the retreat flyer and registration form as soon as we have finalized the agenda. In the meantime, we want to give you a brief overview of the weekend.

We will start with an outdoor reception (cash bar only) on Friday evening in a very scenic, secluded outdoor area with a waterfall. We will then gather in the ballroom to get acquainted and to start stitching. On Saturday, you will be able to stitch all day. However, we will offer some optional alternatives if you would like something more. For example, Kim Sanders has agreed to lead a make-it/take-it session to work on a beautiful counted ornament on Saturday morning. We are inviting a professional photographer to speak to us that afternoon about how to best photograph our needlework. That evening, Sandy Washington will share some ideas about how to make simple stitching accessories from items we have in the house. Then, Terri Bay will discuss the history of whitework. Interspersed among these activities we will have opportunity baskets, a silent auction, games, favors, door prizes and more. We will end with our Region Board of Directors meeting on Sunday morning.

In order to keep the costs down, we are not planning any group meals. However, the hotel offers a



free hot breakfast buffet every morning. In addition, each room in the hotel has a kitchenette with a full-size refrigerator, cooktop (a few units have a full oven), microwave, sink, and some basic kitchen supplies (dishes, glasses, silverware, pots and pans, etc.) so you if you like you will be able to make all of your meals in your room. On the other hand, if you do not want to bring in your groceries and eat all of your meals in the hotel, there are a number of wonderful restaurants in the vicinity.

If you need more incentive, we will be just 10 minutes from "Sandy's X-Stitch on the go" in Hendersonville and just 45 minutes from "Sassy Jacks Stitchery" in Weaverville. There are also a number of interesting local attractions that might catch your interest.

BAN ON CORDED LIGHTS

Perhaps the announcement that will have the most impact on all of you is that National EGA has decided to prohibit the use of corded lights and other corded devices in the classrooms at National Seminars from now on. The reason for this is that hotels have started charging exorbitant rates for using electric cords, and that cost would have to be added to your seminar fees.

This ban takes effect immediately and includes all corded devices (lights, irons, thread straighteners, phones, iPads, etc.). If a teacher needs to use a corded electric device as part of classroom instruction, EGA will negotiate with the hotel on a case-by-case basis.

From now on, you should plan to use a battery-powered or rechargeable light in the classroom, and remember that you will not be able to charge your other appliances in the classroom if you have to use cords during class. Many people find that having a power bank that can charge their light solves their problem. We know that this change causes some distress for you, but it is the best solution if we are to keep your costs down.

NEW EGA CHAPTER FORMED


In this time of decreasing membership that many chapters and regions are experiencing, it was very nice to hear that a new EGA chapter was just chartered in Southern Illinois.

Carolinas Region, EGA – Board of Directors Meeting Fairfield Inn by Marriott, Rock Hill, SC Sunday, October 28, 2018

Call to Order. Region Director Carole Overton called the meeting to order at 10:01 AM at the Fairfield Inn, Rock Hill, SC.

Present. Region Director Carole Overton; Assistant Region Director Cindi Lemkau; Secretary, Newsletter Editor, Website Coordinator Cathie Barker; Treasurer Elizabeth Little; and Education Coordinator Margaret Wiesemann.

Also present. EGA President Janet Noble, past President Leslie Gagliardi, and Bylaws Chair Becky Buie.

Quorum. There being delegates from more than one-third (5) chapters present, a quorum was present.

Minutes. Without objection, the minutes of June 1, 2018 were approved as submitted.

Recognitions. Ms. Noble was recognized for her election as EGA President; Julie Anderson was recognized for winning the Gold Thread Award for Carolinas Region.

EGA President's remarks. Ms. Noble reported:

- As of 2019, only battery-operated lights will be allowed in the classrooms for national seminars
- The new national outreach project is for America's Wounded Service Members. Three project designs will be released at a given time, the first to be released next week, for a total of 18 projects throughout Ms. Noble's term. Each set of three designs, with downloadable instructions, costs \$30. All monies collected will go to the Wounded Service Members project.
- Julie Anderson is now on the national Nominating Committee.

EGA past President's remarks. Ms. Gagliardi made a plea for individuals and chapters to nominate a Gold Thread Award recipient. Every Region should have a Gold Thread Award Winner each year.

Education Coordinator's report. Ms. Wiesemann reported:

- Fall Retreat 2018: Forty-three total attendees: Kurdy Biggs's Crème de la Crème Class – 19, Celeste Chalasani's Calla Lilies Class – 10, and Margaret Wiesemann's Project Safe Class – 26.
- GCCs: In lieu of sponsoring GCCs, last year CAR opted to up the Education Grant for the region's chapters to \$150.
- Master Craftsman: CAR chapter members who are participating in any Master Craftsman program are requested to keep the Education Director informed of your progress.
 - a. Janet Noble finished step 5 for Counted Thread

- Elizabeth Little is working on step 3 for Counted Thread
- c. Cindi Lemkau is working on step 2 for Crewel
- **4. CRESS Scholarship**: No applications for this \$300 scholarship were made last year. Encourage your members to apply. (see application on CAR website).

Treasurer's Report. Ms. Little reported

- 1. The Phillips Grant has been fully expended as of this weekend. Paperwork will be sent to National.
- 2. The financial statements for calendar 2018.
 - a. Executive Committee recommends the Financial Statement be approved. The motion was seconded and passed without objection.
 - Executive Committee recommends that the region approve the chapter program grant in the amount of \$150, upon request, for 2019. Seconded. After discussion and without objection, the motion passed.
 - Executive Committee recommends the budget be approved. Seconded. Without objection, the motion passed.
- 3. Not all chapters have requested the 2018 Chapter Program Grant. There are still funds available. Send request to the Region Director for approval.

News from National. Ms. Overton reported

- 1. Our ad for the national seminar handbook was presented, along with the revised CAR logo.
- 2. After the 2019 Spring Retreat in Flat Rock, NC, no plugin lights will be allowed in the classroom for CAR Seminars and Retreats. Only battery-powered lights will be allowed.
- 3. There will be no sales of chances to attend national seminar this year.
- 4. Upcoming national seminars:
 - a. 2019 St. Louis; October 30 November 3
 - b. 2020 Boston; September 4 8
 - c. 2021 Chicago; September 1 5
- 5. President Noble will form a committee to study what the most effective organization of EGA would be.
- **6.** Ms. Gagliardi recommended members check out the Stitchalong on the EGA Facebook page. These projects may be used as chapter programs. You do not have to have a Facebook account to check, and you can then find the projects archived on the EGA website. New project the first of every month. Projects are free.
