Gold Thread Awards: Deadline for Nominations is May 1, 2025 Submitted by Carole Overton, CAR Website/ZOOM Coordinator

Over the years, EGA National has offered a special award to those whose support for their chapters, regions, and/or National has been outstanding. This award is considered by most members to be the highest and most treasured one given by the organization.

So how does this process work? Each year, EGA solicits nominations from its members. Then, a National EGA committee selects the winners. As described on the EGA National website:

EGA's Gold Thread Awards bestow a total of 12 awards to outstanding individuals at the regional or local level who have given freely of their time and talents, and best exemplify EGA's purpose. The 12 awards represent the 12 EGA regions, and a national Gold Thread Award recipient is also chosen from among the region recipients. Occurring annually alongside EGA National Seminar, recipients have the option to receive their recognition at the Education Awards Presentation at the opening banquet.

Any EGA member may nominate someone. The nomination process is very simple. Applications must be received no later than May 1, 2024. Click on this link for details:

January marks the start of an exciting new outreach program the Aiken Stitchin' Belles are involved with - a Homeschool Stitching Program. Last August, the Chapter participated in the Family Fun Day at the Aiken County Historical Museum which took place during our annual Needlework Exhibit there. Several members helped at tables with Chapter information, examples of our work, and free kits for people to take. The turnout was big, with lots of people showing interest in the exhibit as well as the kits.

Shortly after this fun event, we were contacted by a group of Homeschool parents who asked if we would be willing to do a field trip for their children, with some hands-on stitching using the kits we had created. We happily agreed! The session was attended by about a dozen children and several Moms and was so well received that we were asked if it could be a regularly scheduled activity for them.

Carole Overton volunteered to organize this effort, working with the lead Mom as well as with the Museum to see if they would host the sessions, which they agreed to do.

After holding a planning session with some of our creative and eager members, we developed a list of projects to take us through this year. The kids range in age from 6 to 9, essentially, and the mothers want to join us, so we have planned a series of simple projects, all of which will include the use of needle and thread. At the request of the homeschoolers, we will take the summer and holiday months off.

January - stitch your initials on a "swag bag" to hold your stitching tools **February** - construct and embellish a needle book out of felt shapes

March - construct, embellish, and stuff a felt carrot

April - make and embellish a fabric flower

May - make a crazy guilt (baby doll-sized) or crazy guilt butterfly

June - make friendship bracelets

September - make snowmen out of buttons or felt squares/decorate

October - make wreaths out of yarn-covered rings or make simple Dorset button

The following members have volunteered to lead the sessions: Dorothy Allen, Delisa Beasley, Belinda Ebert, Maxine Martin, Susan MacRae, Yvette McCord, Diana Parfitt, and Carole Overton (Coordinator).

This is an exciting experiment for us, and we anticipate adjusting our plans as we get to the know the children's strengths and weaknesses.

EGA's mission is "Inspiring passion for needle arts through education and the celebration of its heritage." The organization is also looking for ways to increase membership, attract new and younger members, and expand our footprint in our community. This Homeschool project will help the Aiken Stitchin' Belles address all of these needs.
